

President's Message


This past fiscal year 4,040 more children were sponsored seven new community projects started and eleven completed. Many individuals and families in crisis were assisted with emergency funding. A medical mission to Kenya was wonderfully successful and brought medical assistance to thousands of people. This annual report overlooks the thousands of hours of work done throughout our 47 sponsor sites that on a daily basis brought essential and critical support to our sponsored families.

Chalice was also very active in Haiti during the earthquake thanks to receiving donations from concerned sponsors. We dedicated a special staff person to establish local response groups in 13 communities. We have organized emergency food and support immediately after the earthquake. There is still great suffering in Haiti and we continue to work with our sponsor sites to bring assistance and aid. Throughout the South of Haiti, increasing food and oil prices place far more pressure and anxiety on the poor than those who have even a small financial cushion. Even though our help cannot effect major changes, it is having a significant impact on the families we help by providing direct family support, giving educational opportunities, building schools, or giving emergency aid, and bringing relief from anxiety and fear. to ordinary people whom are struggling in dire conditions

I visited 10-year-old Sam and his family in his one-room mud-floored home in southern India. He was very proud to show me the uniform he was wearing, his backpack and all of the school supplies he had received through sponsorship. His Mom showed us the bedding, cooking utensils and other household items they had received as well. We were also able to follow-up on the health check-ups that he had throughout the year.

Every sponsor site accounts for how their funds are spent on the children each quarter by submitting a financial report to the International Finance Office. It is important that we spot check to see that appropriate goods have been purchased as planned for individual children.

A financial field audit is completed on every site at least once every four years. It is wonderful to confirm that inventories and distributions are following a controlled and organized process and that the children have received what has been reported.

Education

“Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world” – Nelson Mandela.

Education brings with it knowledge about health, character-building, a responsibility to participate in community, and a sense of unity with the community, country and the world.

Providing an opportunity for children to attend school not only keeps them busy, it opens up their world and helps them understand the interconnectivity of systems - the earth, human bodies, families, neighbourhoods, communities, countries and the world.

In the developing world a common problem in the area of education is the lack of and/or sustainability of schools in communities. Religious congregations and orders play an integral role in addressing this gap, although they often lack the financial resources to build and operate schools.

In many sites the sponsorship programme pays for school fees, school materials, uniforms, extra tuitions for children who have difficulty in coping with the class, and for extracurricular activities undertaken by the schools. Without this assistance, many families would not be able to afford to send their children to school. In some of our sites we have informal schooling or “bridge school”. The children attending these schools are rescued from the labour market or have been rag pickers. They are prepared for a couple of years in these bridge schools for their entry into formal schooling.

Nutrition



The combination of malnutrition and infection is the leading cause of death among children in the areas where we work. It is estimated that malnutrition accounts for most children's deaths in the developing world. It has devastating impacts on fetal growth and the health, growth and development of children of all ages.

In today's shifting dynamics at grass root levels, we have moved from not just providing our sponsored children and their families with nutrition, but also teaching them how to grow their own food, adapting modern technology as well as using local expertise and knowledge which has been handed down through the ages. Some of our sites provide school midday meals, supplying much-needed nutrients, and preventing hunger and malnutrition.

Improving the nutritional status of children increases enrolment and reduces absenteeism in schools. The school meals provide good nutrition. In some of our sites, nutrition education is carried out as an extracurricular project, namely in the school vegetable garden, poultry pens and fish ponds. These also provide food with valuable extra nutrients. Parents look after the kitchen and cook on a rotational basis. In Luis Amigo Home in Guatemala children tend to some of the 200 chickens they have, which provides meat and eggs and a source of income for the home. The girls take turns in caring for the poultry.

In Cotabato, the children are enjoying their midday meal which includes rice, the staple food, along with some vegetables and some meats namely pork, chicken or fish.



Health



Many of our approaches in providing health care are integrated with our Community Projects and Programmes and our Gift Catalogue. Some of our health programmes focus on developing ways to prevent enteric and diarrheal diseases by creating awareness of the causes of these infections, providing sanitation facilities and safe drinking water. A programme may provide mosquito nets to prevent malaria. Regular medical and dental checkups are conducted and records are maintained and monitored.

HIV remains a constant challenge, especially in our African and Haitian sponsor sites. Chalice sites work with local health partners to promote awareness and testing through the Celebration of Life Programme. Sponsored families within our communities come together for a celebration with food, music, dance and education, focused on the sanctity of our human body and the importance of knowing one's status as it relates to one's overall health. During the festivities sponsored children and their families are tested. Providing an open format with the support of the entire community alleviates the stigma associated with HIV. Our families are then able to receive the care they need to ensure their long-term health and prosperity.

At our PINIFE Sponsor Site in Lima, Peru the Sisters of the Good Shepherd and their team spend lots of time teaching sponsored children about the importance of good hygiene. All of the children are given their own hand towel and are now in the habit of always washing their hands before eating their snack at the sponsor site; they have also all been given toothbrushes and toothpaste and are taught how to brush their teeth properly.

Special Children



Our sponsor sites are located in rural, semi-urban and urban areas where sanitation, management of water resources and basic health facilities are not the best and in some cases may not exist at all. Some of our 'Special Children' are either affected by life threatening diseases with complications which make their medical situation complex, or are born with birth defects. Our sponsorship programme looks after their medical needs and if their medical costs are higher than what the sponsorship funds can provide, support for the family may come through our other funding programmes, namely Critical Need Funds and the Gift Catalogue.

Anita (above) is a seven-year-old child from Guatemala. She has Lupus, along with medical issues like diabetes and other serious illnesses. She has to travel to the capital, Guatemala City which is a six-hour bus ride away, several times a month for medical treatment. Chalice supports the family by covering the cost of travel, medical treatment, tests, and medications.

The gift to hear and speak is often overlooked by many of us but Maria's mother Natalia knows very well the difference it makes in the life of her daughter. Maria (*left*) was born healthy, but due to serious illness as a baby, became deaf and subsequently mute. Finding assistance through Pochaiv Sponsor Site in Ukraine was the greatest hope a mother of four could ask for. With specialized hearing aids Maria is now able to begin school classes and learn to communicate how truly grateful she is for the opportunity to be "just like her siblings".

At our daily morning reflection, the staff of Chalice prays for Maria, Anita, and all our Special Friends for their healing and strength for their families.

Community-building Relationships

In communities all over the globe, empowerment has become a common platform for discussion. Society looks at women to initiate change in communities in the developing world. Women's groups are formed to galvanize the community. The groups are known by different names in different parts of the world.

Women play an important role in bringing about solutions. They are effective organizers and have been successful shifting cultural norms and practices, and bringing about peace and unity. Members of women's groups also play an important role as advisors, counselors and role models. They have become agents of promoting harmony.

Women of some of these communities have been instrumental in the formation of Men's groups as well; all now working for the good of the community and the future of their children.

Chalice, through the sponsorship programme, Sponsor Site Directors and staff, has created this awareness and relationship. They have encouraged communities to resolve their own issues and build sustainable change. In the pictures are mothers of sponsored children coming together to work for the common good of the community.



Faith and Prayers



In many of our sponsor sites where schools are run by the site management, daily kneeling takes place before school starts and in the evening before supper. This practice inculcates into the children the value of prayer and has an impact on their behaviour and outlook. Sponsored children of different creed gather together on a regular basis to pray together for their sponsors.

Disaster Relief



Philippines — September 25th, 2009 – the rains started late night and continued the whole of September 26th. At its peak, Typhoon Ketsana (locally named Ondoy), dumped a whole months rain in just 12 hours, swamping entire towns, setting off landslides and leaving neighbourhoods with destroyed homes, overturned vehicles and roads covered with mud and debris. Many of our sponsored children's houses, situated along the riverbanks, were swept away by the raging waters, along with their belongings. In the following days and weeks, many tried to rebuild their lives after saving their loved ones.

Chalice, working with our sponsor site in Bulacan, rebuilt 24 houses which were completely destroyed and replaced the families belongings. We also rebuilt 26 partially damaged houses and replaced many belongings. At the request of the people, many were supplied with tools and implements. The charismatic Sponsor Site Director Fr. Boyet, rallied the people together and got them back on their feet again.



Haiti — Canadians became intimately engaged with the rebuilding of Haiti following the January 12th Earthquake. The recovery and reconstruction efforts continue today as the level of loss and destruction were unprecedented in the western hemisphere. Chalice remains focused on four areas of response. The first is the care of 349 children displaced from Port-au-Prince; the second is the formation, mobilization and management of Community Development Groups to facilitate community reconstruction efforts; the third is reconstruction and rehabilitation of shared community structures including six schools and 40 single family dwellings; and the last is the continued medical and social support for the building of awareness, prevention and treatment of Cholera and other post-disaster illnesses. With the continued support of our sponsors, our Haitian sites are building brighter and safer communities for tomorrow.



Chile — On February 27, 2010 an 8.8 magnitude earthquake killed 497 people and injured or displaced 2 million people in south-central Chile. This was the world's fifth-strongest earthquake in history bringing widespread destruction, and triggering a tsunami that washed houses out to sea in southern Chile. Disaster relief assistance was provided to the Chalice Sponsor Site in Santiago to repair damaged infrastructure and to assist families directly impacted by the earthquake. With Chalice's support the Good Shepherd congregation increased their presence in some of the most affected regions of the country.

In many of our sponsor sites the government continues to struggle to provide access to education in order for our children to complete their primary and secondary schooling. In East Africa secondary schools are almost non-existent. Therefore, 40% of eligible students are unable to continue their education past the primary level. Mbinga Site works in the most remote areas of south-western Tanzania where in partnership with the government they have built a Kindergarten, a Primary and now a Secondary school inclusive of teacher housing to complete an entire education cycle for the children in our communities.



Community Programme Funding was made available to a group of Mapuche (indigenous) women in Chile to provide training to become silversmiths and weavers, while recapturing their Mapuche heritage/identity. In order to graduate from the programme, the participants had to attend at least 80% of the training (all of the women have families and work outside of home so this was a major challenge for some); as well as successfully completing theoretical and practical exams. The practical exam entailed each participant designing an original piece of jewellery using traditional Mapuche symbols to depict their own identity.



Community Projects and Programmes

Gladis Sagardia, from Cochabamba, Bolivia, is a 49-year-old single mother of five children ranging in age from 11 – 21 years who in 2009 was diagnosed with breast cancer. While her older sons worked tirelessly to help cover the expenses of her treatment, it was impossible for them to cover all the costs. Team members from the local Chalice Sponsor Site, PENNT, made an urgency assistance appeal for the balance of funds. Gladis has a strong desire to regain her health and continue to look after her family, especially the two younger children who share one room with her. She has been described as a fighter full of optimism and with much desire to live. With assistance from Chalice, Gladis underwent surgery with follow-up chemotherapy. Her doctor believes that Gladis has a good chance to beat the cancer.

Kerala – Munnar Girls Dormitory:

The Holy Cross Convent school in Munnar caters to girls from the town and children of migrant workers who come to Munnar to work in the tea plantations. These migrant workers are mainly Dalits (people of the lowest caste) from the plains. The owners of the tea plantations provide them with basic living conditions which are not near the town. Primary education is provided by the tea plantation at the estates. Hence these girls in secondary school have to travel along forest paths which are at times treacherous due to the rains, and they also face the threat of being molested and kidnapped and put into the flesh trade. The dormitory has been a huge help to the girls to carry on their education as well as to the parents who find it very difficult to make ends meet.

The building was built in two phases and accommodates 150 students. The first phase consisted of the first floor which included the dining room, the kitchen, study room and a guest room. The two upper floors are used for the dormitory, the dressing rooms and toilets and the infirmary. The parents and the Provincial of the Holy Cross Sisters also contributed towards the fruition of this project.

At Chalice we get to see this on a daily basis.



This year the catalogue was once again more successful than ever before, allowing us to make more items available to our sponsor sites and increase the impact for families. At Chalice we are all about building relationships: between donors, sponsors, children and the elderly, and also with the Chalice staff.

Every year we create two new catalogues, one for the spring and one that goes out in the fall for Christmas. It is by reading through hundreds of stories from children and families of how receiving a bed and mattress, or how the gift of an animal or food has changed their lives, that we see the difference that you, our supporters make in the developing world. The stories chosen for the catalogues are just a hint of the joy felt in our sites.

Canadian Catholic Support—Marketing

In schools across Canada children are raising money by using small cans to collect pennies and nickels to help provide nutrition, sponsorships and gift items for families through our catalogue.

An inspiring example of youth at work is at St. Joseph's Catholic School in Edmonton. The school has sponsored eight children for many years through our Chalice Children Campaign. Hearing the stories and seeing the faces of the children collecting money and the smiling faces that receive the gifts is truly a blessing that makes it all worthwhile.




Expenses 2010

Programme Expenses by Area



Revenue

Our revenues come largely from sponsorship contributions, most of which originate from the weekend appeals conducted by our deacons and priests. During the past year, and through the goodwill and generosity of the parishes that have enthusiastically welcomed us, 97 such appeals took place, generating 4500 new sponsorships.

Programme Support Expenses include on-site management, financial and operational evaluation, audit and support visits by Canadian staff and other expenses incurred at Head Office in direct support of our sponsor sites and community projects and programmes. A total of 92.5% of expenses is spent on programmes carried out in sponsor sites around the world.
