



## Annual Report 2019-2020

### Chiclayo site Chiclayo, Peru



Chalice has partnered with the Centro Esperanza (Hope Centre) since 2004. Families living in marginalized communities lack basic services such as safe drinking water, sanitation, health services and quality education. Centro Esperanza is a community-based organization that focuses on the empowerment of families by providing workshops for children and mothers. Through after-school support programming, youth leadership clubs and entrepreneurship training for mothers, Chiclayo site is building the groundwork for confident, self-reliant children and families.



### Child



- Chiclayo site supports 392 sponsored children.
- During the COVID-19 school closure, sponsored children participated in the government's educational platform "I Learn at Home." Through this:
  - 99.7% of children continued their classes through the television broadcasts.
  - 73% were able to use mobile phones to interact with their teachers for supplemental learning.
- As of December 2020:
  - 82.4% of children passed the school year.
  - 7.36% stood out with their academic performance.
  - 6 mothers continued their own elementary or secondary education so that they could pursue careers in trades.



### Family

- The Chiclayo site works with 199 families.
- 98.4% of families are enrolled in the national health insurance system which has helped parents and guardians understand and improve their children's nutritional needs.
- Site staff have trained mothers about nutrition, food preparation and food hygiene.
- 99% of guardians are in the formal banking system and make use of their personal savings cards.
- Chiclayo site supported 70 families of sponsored children with essential food hampers with the support of Chalice's COVID-19 disaster fund.



### Community

- Chiclayo site supported 20 families of non-sponsored children with essential food hampers with the support of Chalice's COVID-19 disaster fund.
- With the support of Chalice donors, Chiclayo site supported 1500 migrants from Venezuela with urgent needs including supplying medicine, surgeries, hospitalizations, burial expenses, food, beds, mattresses, and housing.
- The site staff also supported 793 Venezuelan migrants through their immigration paperwork.
